Welcome

It's hard to believe now that prior to the year 2000 there was nowhere in the world a dedicated annual short story festival. The short story genre was held in such little esteem authors had great difficulty in placing collections with mainstream publishers. The Munster Literature Centre founded the Frank O'Connor International Short Story Festival in 2000 with the aim of reviving the reputation of Frank O'Connor and sustaining the art form in which he excelled, an art form which had also intrigued the great Cork geniuses of Elizabeth Bowen, Daniel Corkery, Seán Ó Faoláin, and William Trevor. Soon other organisations pitched in across the planet with dedicated (though short-lived) festivals, short-story genre development initiatives, journals with a *grá* for the short story etc. For many years journo hacks would churn out articles on the death of the art form or its undeserved lack of popularity. It's been some years since I've come across that old chestnut. The short story is back in vogue. Today publishers more easily take on short story collections, even if they occasionally, venally, try to hide the fact that they are not novels.

With the revival of Frank O'Connor's reputation deemed to be a mission accomplished we changed the title of the festival to the Cork International Short Story Festival, though O'Connor is still remembered by the annual appointment of a Frank O'Connor International Short Story Fellow, who this year is the Canadian Alexander MacLeod. The festival has featured many masters over the years, Richard Ford, Julia O'Faolain, Bernard MacLaverty, Lydia Davis, Edna O'Brien to name but a few. We have featured well-established authors while they were still unknown such as Yiyun Li and Miranda July, as well as authors well on the way to global fame such as Claire Keegan, Jhumpa Lahiri and Etgar Keret.

This year we have many fabulous debut authors in our line-up, authors whose names I'm confident will be someday as well-known as Li, Lahiri, Keegan and Keret. We feature also this year Éilís Ní Dhuibhne, a senior bilingual Irish author releasing her *Selected Stories*, marvellous midcareer writers such as Thomas Morris and Kim Fu and a writer such as Gan Ye, who with a reputation developed in her native Chinese, begins all over again in English. As a nation of emigrants, we celebrate this year at the festival the diaspora of others as well as those who choose to come live on our shores. Thomas Morris, Fija Callaghan and Radhika Iyer are writers who have chosen to come write here. Inga Balchaites was born here of parents we used to call the 'New Irish'. We look forward to the emergence of many new Irish writers in coming years with names not to be found in 20th century Irish phone books.

As a festival charged with the responsibility of developing and sustaining a particular literary genre, we devote much space to emerging authors alongside the established. The number of journals and anthologies published out of Cork is indicative of a literary scene which is thriving so much better than in the year 2000 and we thank our partners associated with *The Four Faced Liar, From the Well* and *HOWL New Irish Writing* for curating events which show the breadth of talent in this part of Ireland. We are featuring vintage RTÉ documentaries from the 60s and 70s which demonstrate how essential and significant publicly funded broadcasting can be, at a time when market-driven vested interests will question that truth.

We present many events for free and never charge more than a fiver for other events – all to make the festival accessible to persons of all socioeconomic backgrounds. Our venues are wheelchair friendly. We encourage audience participation from across all of society.






Southword is a print literary journal published twice a year by the Munster Literature Centre. Southword has published the likes of Kim Addonizio, Tess Gallagher, Vona Groarke, Helen Ivory, James Lasdun, Medbh McGuckian, Haruki Murakami, Ron Rash and Colm Tóibín. Here we present three fiction writers based in Ireland whose stories have appeared in the two most recent issues of Southword.





Deirdre Crowley is an artist and writer from West Cork, Ireland. Her stories have been published in *The Irish Times, The Ogham Stone*, *The Southern Star*, and The Well Short Story Competition. In 2017,

she was one of twelve writers in The Sunday Business Post Short Story Award Shortlist; 2018 Fish Memoir Prize Longlist; 2019 Seán Ó Faoláin International Short Story Competition Longlist. In 2022 she was published by the Bournemouth Writing Prize and *Southword*.





J.P. Garvey began to send out stories and poems to competitions when Covid struck. Since then, he has been shortlisted and published in 'Poets meet Politics' and longlisted for the Nature and Place Poetry Competition. He placed 2nd and 1st (2021, 2022) in I.O.'s Annual Short Story Competition and 2nd last year

in the Seán Ó Faoláin International Short Story Competition. He is currently putting together a collection which he hopes to publish soon.

Patrick Holloway is the winner of The Bath Short Story Prize, The Molly Keane Creative Writing Competition, The Flash 500 Prize, the Allingham Fiction Prize, among others. He was second in The Raymond Carver Short Story contest, was highly commended for the Manchester Fiction Prize and shortlisted for many prizes including The Bath Short Story Prize, Moth Short Story Prize, Bath Flash Fiction Prize, and the prestigious Alpine



Fellowship for Fiction. His work has appeared in *Southword, The Stinging Fly, The Irish Times, The Irish Independent, Carve, The London Magazine, The Moth,* and many others. He is an editor of the literary journal, *The Four Faced Liar.*





Órfhlaith Foyle is a short story writer, poet, dramatist and lives in Galway. Doire Press will publish her third collection *Three Houses in Rome* in September 2023. She wrote and directed the radio dramas *May's End* and *How I Murdered Lucrezia*, both adapted from her short fiction. Both received full BAI funding and premiered on Newstalk Radio in October 2021 and 2023. Órfhlaith received a full Arts Council Agility Award 2021 to complete a first draft of *Three Houses in Rome* and was awarded a full Arts Council Literary Bursary in 2022 for her next work.







Beverly Parayno was raised in East San José, California by immigrant parents from the Philippines. Her work appears in Narrative Magazine, Bellingham Review, The Rumpus, Warscapes, Huizache, and Southword. Her work has been translated into Mandarin and published by World Literature. Parayno is the author of the story collection Wildflowers (PAWA Press, 2023). She earned a BA from San José State University, an MA from University College Cork, and an MFA from Vermont College of Fine Arts. She lives and works in Cameron Park, California as a development professional and animal communicator and facilitates the Cameron Park Library Writers Workshop.


Neil Campbell's fifth collection of stories *Licensed Premises* is out now. From Manchester, England, he has appeared four times in the annual anthology of *Best British Short Stories*. He has published three novels, five collections of short stories, two poetry chapbooks and a poetry collection, as well as appearing in numerous magazines and anthologies.




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
Yan Ge was born in Sichuan, China in 1984. She is a fiction writer in both Chinese and English, who has received numerous awards, including the prestigious Mao Dun Literature Prize (Best Young Writer), and was named by People's Literature magazine as one of twenty future literature masters in China. Her work has been translated into English, French and German, among other languages. She has an MFA in creative writing from the university of East Anglia where she was the recipient of UEA International Award 2018/19. Elsewhere (Faber and Faber, 2023) is her English-language debut.


Reading & Discussion - Queer Fabulism

Moïra Fowley is an author, tarot reader, and part-time witch. She is half-Irish, half-French and lives in Dublin with her two children. Moïra is the author of

three critically acclaimed YA novels which have been shortlisted for the Waterstones Children's Book Prize, the Irish Book Awards, and the Children's Books Ireland Awards, as well as being nominated for the Carnegie Medal and winning the School Library Association of Ireland Great Reads Award. Her first book for adults, *Eyes Guts Throat Bones*, a collection of short stories about (queer, female) bodies and the end of the world, is published by W&N/Orion.



Kim Fu is the author of two novels, a collection of poetry, and most recently, the story collection Lesser Known Monsters of the 21st Century (2022), winner of the Pacific Northwest Book Award and the Danuta Gleed Literary Award, and a finalist for the Scotiabank Giller Prize, the Ignyte Awards, and the Shirley Jackson Awards. Stories in this collection have been selected for Best American Science Fiction and Fantasy and Best of the Net, featured on Levar Burton Reads and Selected Shorts, and optioned for television and film.

She has published in *Magma Poetry, New Irish Writing, Poetry Ireland's ePub, Southword, Amsterdam Quarterly* and elsewhere. Róisín is a Poetry Ireland Introductions poet, and recipient of an Arts Council Award and Cork City Artist Bursary.

Kate Moore is a writer from Tralee, now based in Cork City. Her theatre work has been featured in the Everyman, Cork Arts Theatre and Siamsa Tire, and has been published in *The Irish Times* and *Quare Cork*. 
